The entire message of this endeavour was to bring out both aspects of Inter-human relationships the positive and the negative aspects.


The positive side showed how man related with his neighbour, how he should so relate, and also how certain organisations and charitable institutions were truly following these principles.

Where Children Run The Show



Vigyan Bhawan was packed with dignitaries, ambassadors, proud parents and eager children on the 24th January 1971. On the dias sat Arojit De of Class VIII B by the side of the President of India, Mr. V.V. Giri. Shanker Augrish of Class IX E, along with three children from other Delhi schools, occupied the same privileged position.

The occasion was the prize-giving function of Shankar's International Children's Competition 1970. Children from all over the world had sent 1, 75,000 entries in painting and writing. 443 prizes were being distributed by the President of India to the children of various countries and their representatives. The President's Gold Medal for the best painting had been won by Miss Idiko Madaraz of Hungary, and Miss Jaculine Farrell received the Vice-President's Gold Medal for the best literary entry. Arojit De and Shanker Augrish had secured the 1st and 3rd places in an Elocution competition arranged to choose children who were to conduct this function. Thus Arojit De gained the coveted and honoured rank of the president of the prize-

A. De function. Thus Arojit De gained the coveted and honoured rank of the p giving function. He conducted himself with grace and poise and could well have been the envy of many a politician. In his speech he stressed the universality of childrens' aspirations the world over. He expressed the hope that this competition would bring the children of the world together and create better understanding among them. He even had a dig at the politicians who sometimes forgot that competing was not fighting. Healthy competition, he said, brought out the best in each person.

For his remarkable performance Arojit De was awarded the Nehru Gold Medal. Shanker Augrish received valuable books for making the thanksgiving speech with ease and confidence.

President V.V. Giri seemed very happy to be among the children. He complimented the prize-winners and advised his young friends to refrain from imitating 'bad' parliamentarians—those who disturbed the dignity, equanimity and decorum of the Houses of Parliament. He lauded the performance of the children who had managed the show.

A VISIT TO THE COCA-COLA PLANT

We were agreeably surprised one Wednesday in August when we were told that a visit to the Coca-Cola Plant was part of the day's programme. And so it was that after a pleasant journey in one of the firm's luxury coaches we reached the Shankar Market branch of the Coca-Cola Company.

On our arrival there we were received by an enthusiastic chemist who promptly started our educational tour of the manufacturing plant. With the aid of a portable loudspeaker he told us of the meticulous attention that they give to maintain a very high standard of hygiene.

He began by explaining to us the process of purifying the water used for bottle-washing and in the manufacture of Coca-Cola. The water is first chlorinated, then passed through a sand purifier, followed by a carbon purifier and is finally softened.

We were next shown the massive bottle-washing plant with the help of which hundreds of empty bottles are washed thoroughly, by a series of jets, in a few minutes. As a further precaution the bottles are made to pass, by means of a conveyor belt, under the vigilant eye of an employee whose duty it is to see that no foreign matter remains in any of the bottles.

Even all these precautions are not enough, for carbon dioxide—which is 99% pure—and sugar (that we consume daily), have to pass through a series of purifying processes prior to usage.

After the bottles are absolutely clean they are automatically filled with the beverage and compressed carbon dioxide by a machine which bottles 350 bottles a minute. The bottling of Coca-Cola does not mark the end of the process of manufacture, for the filled bottles are again inspected by a worker to see that the desired level of Coca-Cola in each bottle is kept. Besides this, bottles of Coca-Cola are picked out at random and routine checks carried out to ensure that the standard of the product reaches international standards. After this a visit to the laboratory, gas-room, and sugar purification sections, concluded our tour of the main manufacturing plant.

We were next taken to the Auditorium where we were each treated to an ice-cold Coca-Cola which all of us found refreshing after the lengthy though very enjoyable tour. While we sipped our Cokes the Manager of the Plant found the time and the patience to answer all our questions.


As if this were not enough we were each presented with a souvenir of our visit to the Coca-Cola Plant — a visit that was both interesting and well-organized.

When leaving the Plant my attention was drawn to the fact that Coca-Cola satisfies the food standards of 140 countries of the world. It certainly satisfies mine. And when I take my daily Coke in school I will have much to remember.

"Louis!" My teacher's voice is loud




MY DREAM

Go, stand in a corner".





"THE DWINDLING WORLD"

The various media of communications have made it such that we can now truthfully say that there is scarcely any area in the world which can be termed as remote or inaccessible. In fact, we can even assert that, for all practical purposes, large distances are now immaterial and the world is more com-

pact than ever before.

Ever since the evolution of mankind it has been evident that people have greatly desired to maintain contact with their fellow-human beings. It was natural that people of different lands should seek to communicate with each other, yet it was to be a long time before any concrete steps were taken in this direction. The first significant developments were the invention of the telephone and the discovery of wireless transmission.

Since then, science has taken gigantic steps forward. From telephonic links between different continents to the use of telstar satellites, science has considerably reduced the relative distances between different regions of the world. People have been brought closer and international understanding has been

promoted to a large extent.

It is now possible to be in one continent and yet be abreast of the affairs in other continents. By means of the telephone, the teleprinter service and communication satellites, news can be flashed across the entire world. Almost as soon as an event occurs, details of it are being relayed to various parts of the world. In the case of natural calamities this is a big help, as people learn of the suffierings of their fellow-beings and can

promptly rush aid to them.

For those who are not satisfied by merely hearing about an event, there is the additional facility of television. In countries with extensive television networks, 'live' telecasts are relayed by means of orbiting satellites, making it possible for one to be present, so to say, in two places at the same time. Thus, television, too, has lessened the relative size of the world. Closely related to this are

radio broadcasts. Although the radio is still invaluable in relaying news, yet it has lost its original charm and less reliance is placed on it these days.

Yet there are people who are not satisfied with just seeing and hearing of events. They wish to be actually present on important occasions. Science has made allowances for such people too. Almost throughout the day, at every city's airport, there are sleek, streamlined jet-liners waiting on the tarmac with engines ticking over, ready to whisk one off to one's destination. This, obviously


is for the affluent classes only. Even the less well-to-do can avail of transportation facilities. Comfortable ships ply between various parts of the world almost every week, though, naturally, they are more time-consuming. Trains are useful too, and so are cars, but to a lesser extent. It is obvious that these different forms of transport have made a mockery of long distances. and the world can no longer be regarded as a jumble of disconnected inhabited areas.

There are numerous other media of communication, of which it is not possible to list. Some of the important inventions which have helped to foreshadow the large distances are the use of micro-waves, the laser beam and the trunk system. And for all their diversity, they have but one end in view, namely, pushing into the background the

largeness of the world.

How far they have been successful in attaining this objective can be judged from the results. People all over the world enjoy the facility of knowing about the happenings elsewhere. We can only pray that, in the future-research will meet with more successes and will be able to diminish the relative size of the world. Perhaps, even a device to teleport men to different places will be invented. This certainly not impossible, for as a wise saying reads, 'truth is stranger that fiction'.

But I am told that love is stronger than walls, and in this lies my hope


Please try to beat down those walls with firm hands,

For I am every man you meet and I am every woman you meet.





The Bureau Of Vocational & Educational Counselling

In India we are facing a paradoxical situation—there are too many people with no jobs and too many posts with no people to fill them up.

Two phenomena are mainly responsible for this: the population explosion and the explosion of knowledge. The first phenomenon accounts for the fact that whenever a conventional type of job is advertised, there is a deluge of applicants, on the other hand, ex-

plains why any job that is slightly off the beaten track finds no takers or, at best, untrained ones.

Add to this, the problem of Educational Aimlessness. School and college students choosing courses of study just to obtain degrees, with no intentions whatsoever of transferring what they learn in their institutions to their personal or vocational lives. In fact, many of our youth today simply

do not know what they would like to do once they have completed their studies.

Research studies have shown that our youngsters know only a small percentage of the number of jobs that exist in India and only a few students know the course of action to follow (regarding training and recruitment) in order to achieve employment in them.

The Bureau of Vocational and Educational Counselling was founded in 1954 in order to deal with some of the problems cited above. Every year the Bureau offers Educational guidance to school children who have to choose one of the several streams of study viz. Humanities, Science, Commerce, Fine Arts, Home Science, Technical etc.

It gives this guidance after a thorough appraisal of each child's apptitudes, interests, achievements, family and social background, and takes into account the opinions and expectation, of their class teachers and parents. This appraisal, far from being subjective, is done with the help of standardized, objective psychological tests that have been specially constructed for the purpose and have been perfected over years of testing and revision, both in India and in the U.S.A. As they stand now, these tests have extremely high reliability and validity.

They are proving very successful for the purpose of prediction.

The Bureau also gives Vocational Guidance to youngsters who have completed school or college and are about to face the world of occupations. It maintains an extensive list of occupations along with the details for being employed in them viz: what is the minimum training, or qualification, required, what types of persons are best suited for certain jobs, the pay, future prospects, the work it will entail, and a host of other details. As the employment situation in India deteriorates, it is getting more and more young men and women coming to get their vocational problems solved.

The Bureau also gives counselling to problem children—delinquents, truants, bed-wetters, kleptomaniacs, and the emotionally mal-adjusted. It also has provisions for remedial teaching of the educationally handicapped.

St. Columba's High School, New Delhi, commissioned the services of the Bureau for the educational guidance of Class VIII in 1970. The Bureau is again helping this year's batch in making their choice of stream.

All India JUNIOR REGATTA

Three Columban's had learnt the not too common sport of sailing in 1970 (COLU-MBAN 1970, A-sailing We Did Go). After passing this beginners stage, the first All India Junior Regatta was an ideal kick start for obtaining racing experience. So two of us, Ajay Kumar and Vikram Jog as helmsman (skipper) and crew respectively were sent to Poona to participate from 17th to 22nd May 1971.

Although we were hosted by the Corps of Engineers at Kirkee, our races were held at the Connaught Boat Club Poona in the Mula river. Ten teams from all over the country were participating. A special feature of a regatta a social activity; here it included tours to the Military College and the National Defence Academy, movies and a dance night. Thus a spirit of friendliness and sportsmanship existed in all the races.

To get to the racing part if it, it was a bit disappointing as far as we were concerned. Our morale was boosted only in the practice races, where our team stood in the first four places. Encouraged by this, we did well to stand fifth in the first actual race.

This was followed by an unfortunate debacle. We were forced to retire in two races: once we "irrevocably capsized and in another, while running in sixth position, fouled another boat. So in each we were given the points of the last place! The worst was when in one race we had finished a commendable fourth; but a collision had occured with another boat and the protest committee unfortunately disqualified us.

Seeking to redeem our position we went all out in the last race; and having gone well three-quarters of the way we found that the race had been cancelled because of the course being blocked by weeds. Thus we had to total the points of the four completed races; we had an appaling total of 59 points and stood among the lower ranks. The winner was of the Bombay Sea Cadet Corps and deserved the Admiral's Trophy which he won.

In conclusion I feel that we have gained invaluable experience and with some luck we can fare better next time.

WHO ARE THE ADDICTED?

(Statement by National Jewish Council U.S.A.)

It is not hard to point out those who are addicted, who turn to alcohol or drugs or violence, seeking a quick release from problems they feel helpless to attack.

But why do we so often try short-cuts to the good, deceiving ourselves that it can be easily achieved?

It is, of course, easier to see this in the lives of others than to recognize it in our own.

We see it tragically today in the growing numbers of our young who addict themselves to drugs.

They profess to be living more fully when they seek to make their contact with the good through the chemistry of drugs.

Yet in so doing are they not refusing to face the challenges, the persistent struggles, and even the frustrations, required to achieve any good?

Are they living more full—or, instead, are they evading life?

As Parents:

How many of today's parents are facing-up to the reality that there are no short-cuts to the good, within their own home?

They will often imagine, with all sincerity, that they are providing a good life for their children and themselves by multiplying every material security for their family. As though any amount of material goods and ambitions can be enough to create a healthy family.

To be a parent, instead of only a provider, is to give our children our presence, as well as our presents. It is to understand them: and to give them our patience as well as our love.

It is not only to instruct but also to listen; not only to criticize them but to accept and respond to their criticism, as well.

For how else can we teach our children to listen and respond to us.

In what other ways can we hope to reach our children deeply enough to shape their characters and their lives for the good? To imagine there is some lesser or easier way is to be addicted to an evasion of reality.

Our Teachers

How many educators, in this age of wonderful technologies, have become addicted to the uses of short-cuts to good education?

We must never diminish our attention to the crucial needs for improving and expanding all of our educational resources.

Yet, all of us will fail to face reality if we assume that any combination of the material resources for good education can be substituted for the primary educational resource: a good teacher.

It never was easy to be a good teacher. Nor can it be. Involvement in one's subject is essential but even more insistent is the unending need to be involved in the lives of one's students; to work unremittingly to transmit to them not information alone, but also the desire to learn—and to build the student's character by the teacher's consistent example of what good character means.

We can be sure that nothing less can teach wisdom as well as knowledge; nothing less can truly educate our young.

The Leader of Our Society:

Our leaders fail us whenever they turn to illusory short-cuts to the good.

We, and they, must not lose sight of the inescapable fact that no new weapon-system, no new laws, no new government programmes, important as they may be, are enough to bring the solutions to the problems which overwhelm us to day.

Anyone who imagines he has found, or can find, some abrupt way to solutions is wrong. And leaders who yield to the temptation of officing simple answers, where there are none, are turning their backs on reality instead of coping with it. They too are addicted to the immediate rather than the good.

Such addictions become profoundly dangerous as we move against the stubborn, complex problems of our time: of our cities, of our nation, of the world—of our bitter racisms, our violences at home and abroad, the stain of our poverty-stricken and of the world's poverty stricken.


What we need from our leaders—as much as from ourselves, our young, our parents and our teachers—are the great strengths of reality, vision and character. We need their determination and dedication, and our own, to keep advancing on the long road to the good—whatever difficulties and disappointments and frustrations we may find on the way.


Therefore, we must know that, in every aspect of our lives, and of society......

Yet neither are we free to neglect it.







One power could, would, and did.



VISITORS FROM ABROAD




We hope that this visit will be the biginning of many more foreign visitors to St. Columba's. They will be always assured of a big welcome.

FOOTBALL





This article would not be complete without mention of our school orchestra which performed so splendidly on all three occasions under the able supervision and leadership of Mr. Kuriakose.
















Table Tennis has flourished in St. Columba's in 1971. The year began in December last year when V. Tuli, N. Sachdev, A. Mody, S. Kurup were chosen to represent Delhi in the National T.T. Championship. They had been seeded one, two, three and four respectively. Though none of them reached the finals in the National Championship, they played well and were only narrowly beaten.

We began 1971 by entering the Saxena Club Open T.T. Tournament. In the Boy's Final Naveen beat Vinay in straight sets: 21-18, 21-15, 21-18. Shortly afterwards Vinay was forced to give up the game for the year. An operation and the pressure of studies in his final year in school caused this. He did occasionally take part in a tournament but his game was affected by lack of practice. We hope to see him back in full training next year.

In the Delhi Public College Tournament (Open) S. Kurup won the Boys Singles beating A. Narang (Modern School) in the Fmak.


In the Delhi Public School Open Tournament Naveen and Santosh contested the Final of the Boys Singles, the former winning by three game to two.



Swimming Notes, 1971

After the swimming pool had been given a new look the swimming season opened in mid-March with the usual enthusiasm among the younger groups. Apart from the swimming periods incorporated in the class time-tables, the pool was available every evening from three to five for beginners. The school team was put through its paces, even during the long summer recess and by the time the first open competition was scheduled to commence a strong team was ready to face the keen contests usually associated with the Delhi Swimming Meets.

The first meet took place in mid August with teams from Bombay, Aligarh, Jullunder and Ajmer competing in the All India Childrens Competition. The highlight of this meet was the record set up by the under 14 team in the 4 x 50 metres relay; the old record stood at 2 min. 44.1 secs. the new timing was 2 min. 22.3 secs. In the final placing of teams St. Columba's were first in the under 10, second in the under 14 and third in the under 16.

Early in September the swimming teams, both Senior and Junior, won the Delhi Schools Championship with comparative ease. Sunil Kumar shattered a long-standing record in the 50 metres freestyle with a timing of 32 secs.

The highlight of Delhi swimming is the yearly State meet which was held in mid-September; never since St. Columba's first entered the swimming meets did the team score such an outstanding success as it did in this competition. The team won all the divisions for boys, under 10, under 12, under 14 and under 16. The following created new records: Sanjay Mehra, 50 metres breaststroke under 12, Ravi Krishnamurthy, 50 metres backstroke under 10, Ravi Paintal 50 metres backstroke under 10, The following was the final position of the teams:

The swimming season culminated with the School Gala on Sept. 25th before a very large gathering of parents at the school pool. Three records were set up by Sunil Kumar in the 100 metres freestyle and the 50 metres butterfly and by Cecil Falleiro in the 50 metres breaststroke under 12.

The outstanding swimmers of the year were B. Vishwanath, Sunil Kumar, H.K. Dhanda, Joseph Kuok, Ravi Krishnamurthy, Ravi Paintal, Gautam Paintal, Cecil Falleiro and Rohit Sharma.

HOCKEY







The term of the present TRUMPET committee comes to an end this year. The TRUMPET run under the personal supervision of Mr. R. Doyle reached new heights, with record sales being effected. Most of the 1250 copies printed each month were sold among the Junior, Middle and Senior schoolboys. A small percentage of the total was also sold in the Convent of Jesus and Mary.

The main aim of the committee was to bring, in simple language, to the students, any happening of interest in any sphere of school activity. Usually the Sports Page took up much of the space. The juniors, however, were in no way ignored. A whole page was devoted to them under a column headed 'Junior School Calling'.

It was the duty of the committee to scour every nook and cranny of the school to collect articles from budding journalists. It took a lot of persuation from teachers and members of the editorial staff to make the students submit their articles as the boys were not often sure if their articles would be worth printing.

After the collection of matter began the strenuous process of proof-reading. This usually took a long time as the Committee had to see that no mistakes appeared in the final format of the magazine.

By the first week of every month the committee members had distributed the TRUMPETs in each class. Then came the difficult task of collecting the money. Usually, the boys had to be out in the last period for three to four days to realise the full amount.

The TRUMPET made a small profit most months, though the idea was to sell it 'on a noprofit basis'.

The only hope of the committee is that the tradition of the TRUMPET is carried on for years to come.




Master Umesh Arora Memorial Prize

Junior School Concert


On Thursday, April 22nd, the TINY-TOTS of the Junior School, classes K.G. & I, presented a variety programme in the Junior School Auditorium.





SOME OF OUR TEACHERS



In Far-away Places

The Christian Brothers (once called Irish Christian Brothers) are in many lands. They are well known in most English speaking countries and in many countries where Spanish is the language. Their Schools are to be found in the big cities, in the small towns, in lonely Islands in the Pacific, in far-away places with strange sounding names. They teach in schools for the poor, for the rich, they look after Orphans and neglected children. They have Schools for Deaf and Dumb children. They lecture in Universities, they teach in Technical Schools. In Australia they have a huge Ranch School where boys are trained to be sheep-farmers. It is hoped that the dedication of the Brothers and their service to others will serve as a witness to all of the things they believe in and of what they hope for.

Perhaps the least known of their many undertakings is the work they do in the Continent of Africa for native African boys, coloured boys, and boys whose ancestors came from Asia.

In South Africa the Government policy of Apartheid requires that there be separate schools for whites and non-whites. The Brothers are compelled to fall into line with this policy. But where we have a school for whites we alsways have a school for African and Asian Boys.

All our S. African schools are private, receiving no financial aid from the Government. They depend solely on the support which the European Schools and Colleges so willingly contribute, and were it not for this assistance, it would be impossible for the Brothers to run these schools.


Our first school for African boys was opened in Kimberley in 1935. For the past 36 years, the Brothers, with the help of an efficient lay-staff, have laboured successfully in this wonderful work. People donate money to

provide bursaries for deserving ex-pupils who wish to do higher studies in the University. In the same way the Brothers are dependent on the generosity of people for building funds and for Science Laboratories and Libraries.

In 1951 an African High School (St. Boniface's) was built in Kimberley and Brothers came from U.S.A. to staff it. In the twenty years of its existence its record of scholastic achievements and the quality of its ex-pupils has done much to enhance the reputation of this school. The Brothers also conduct a big primary school for African boys in Bloemfontein in the Orange Free State. Another school, this time a Boarding School, has been built at Tweespruit in the Orange Free State, and will be functioning in early 1972. This school for African boys will have pupils from K.G. to Matriculation and it is hoped that it will become the nucleus for the training of African leaders. It is hoped also that boys from this school may become Christian Brothers to meet the increasing demand in Africa for Catholic Schools among the different African races. In most of our European schools in S. Africa the Brothers conduct night classes for young African working-men who wish to improve their education. This is done voluntarily.

Were any of our Delhi boys to visit S. Africa they might be surprised to see a familiar figure in a white cassock striding along and they might wonder how Br. O' Farrell came to be there. Yes, Br. O' Farrell is there, and has been there for nearly 35 years. It is not our Br. O' Farrell they would met but his twin brother. They were identical as youngsters and the likeness is still very striking. They were born in the city of Waterford nearly sixty years ago. C.F. joined the Christian Brothers in Ireland, and, after his training, he

was sent to India. J. C. joined the Brothers in England, and on the completion of his training, he worked in England for a number of years. He was then transferred to South Africa. Since 1933 they have met only three times, the last time being this summer when they were together for five days after a separation of 14 years. Br. J.C. has been intimately connected with another St. Columba's—St. Columba's School for Coloured boys in Cape Town. He was Principal of that school for six years. He is quite a linguist and has been teaching through the medium of Afrikaans and is now in a school where the medium is Tswana. Both brothers are still enthusiastic tennis players in spite of the fact that the years are catching up. They still possess beautiful tenor voices. Though far apart they correspond frequently and at length.

The Christian Brothers have many schools in the continent of Africa. In Zambia alone they have four large boarding schools—at Mazabuka, Choma, Mangu, and Lukulu. The latter School bears the name of St. Columba. In January we are opening a large boarding school at Livingstone on the shores of Lake Nyasa. The Brothers from England have opened a school in the backwoods of Liberia in a place called the Nimba country. It has neither electricity nor piped water.

The African Nations are marching ahead to progress and the Christian Brothers are doing something to help them on their way.
